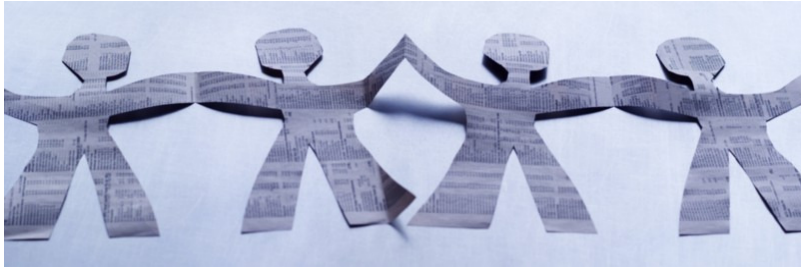


Funding advice from T3SC

Grants for buildings

The Trusthouse Charitable Trust

Priorities/aims: Broad funder, with three particular areas of interest: health care and disability; community support and education and the arts.

How much: Small grants – under £10,000, large grants over £10,000 – only for capital projects (e.g. buildings)

Application process: Via an online application. They can be submitted at any time of the year but the Grants Committee meets quarterly and applications need to be received at least two months before a meeting (dates available on the website)

Co-operative Foundation Community Support Fund *The co-operative*

Priorities/aims: The Co-operative Foundation is keen to support community and voluntary sector activity through grants to local groups and organisations across its trading area. It is particularly interested in locally led and run groups which can demonstrate evidence of co-operative values and principles: self-help, equality, democracy, concern for the community.

How much: Grants up to £30,000.

Application process: Application form available online, or call number below. Quarterly Trustee meetings.

Priorities/aims: Very broad in terms of what it will fund. Generally, interested in work that 'addresses the social, emotional and financial needs of people at the margins of society'

How much: No maximum or minimum.

Application process: Two stage process. Initial applications via letter.

Tameside Older People's Partnership— opening doors for older people



Priorities/aims: the fund is available to any organisation for older people. It is particularly aimed at new or expanding services or activities which directly benefit older people.

How much: Three levels of funding are available: up to £20,000; £20,000 - £60,000 and £60,000 - £150,000.

Application process: Application forms are available from Vicki Gee on 0161 370 1179. There is a separate form for amounts up to £300

The Clothworkers Foundation

Priorities/aims: Main funding areas are to encouragement of young people; social inclusion; elderly; disability; visual impairment; textiles. Funding is only for capital costs. Main grants programme is available for charities with a turnover of between £250,000 and £10 million, small grants are available to groups with a turnover of less than £250,000.

How much? Two grants programmes, small grants programme will give grants from £500 to £10,000. there is also a main grants programme with no limit.

Application process: Applications should be made online. For main grants there could be a delay of up to six months, whereas the small grants programme should turn round applications in six weeks. However, please check that programme is still open before applying.

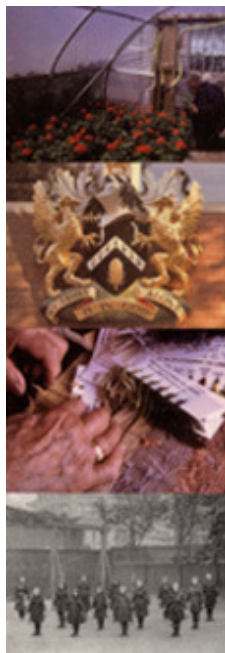

Priorities/aims: Generally funds projects in the North West, with some preference for children and educational work but does fund generally.

How much: No maximum or minimum amounts specified.

Big Lottery—Community Sustainable Energy Programme

Priorities/aims: The Community Sustainable Energy Programme will provide £8 million to community-based organisations for the installation of microgeneration technologies, such as solar panels or wind turbines and energy efficiency measures including loft and cavity wall insulation.

How much: Project Development Grants can be for up to £5,000 or 75% of the project cost, whichever is the lower. Capital grants are for up to £50,000 or 50% of the project cost, whichever is the lower.

Application process: Online or hard copy application form.

Children in Need

Priorities/aims: Organisations working with disadvantaged children and young people who must be 18 years and under, living in the UK. Will support projects on behalf of children and young people living in a disadvantaged area; give one year grant to capital projects. Applicants need to be not for profit, constituted groups

Application process: Online application form followed by telephone interview.

Lankelly Chase Foundation

Priorities/aims: Supports work that has a recognizable charitable nature. Particularly keen to support smaller groups that manage themselves well and are committed to equal opportunities. Main funding areas are: arts; heritage; breaking the cycle; developing communities; free and quiet minds; offenders and society.

How much: Historic buildings: up to £10,000.

Developing communities: up to £50,000.

Application process: Can submit applications anytime but allow at least six months for a decision.

How much: Grants range from £500 - £125,000 most are smaller amounts
