Using the Funding Guide

This guide has been designed to be your first step on the road to successful funding applications. It provides information on the main sources of funding and contact details of many of the main local and national funders, as well as brief details about their different funds and criteria.

Funders receive large numbers of applications from groups and organisations that simply are not eligible or relevant to their work. This can be great waste of time and expense (both to funders and for you!) After using this booklet, please make sure you obtain each funder's guidelines and application form (if relevant) and read them carefully before making an application.

The Toy Trust

Aims: Toy Trust funds help disadvantaged children (aged between birth and 13) their families and communities directly involved with children to: Alleviate suffering, Support children through awful experiences, Encourage achievement through adversity, Purchase vital equipment, Provide care, Bolster existing initiatives, Initiate brand new projects, Satisfy basic needs

Youth Opportunities Fund

Aims: to support young people aged 13 - 19 by awarding money to young people's projects across Tameside. The idea must come from young people themselves and should provide things for them to do or places to go. Projects should also have a learning outcome/ accreditation.

How much? There isn't a minimum or maximum amount.

Youth Action Grants

Aims: to support young people aged 11 - 19 in Tameside. The project or activity must make a positive change to the lives of young people and must involve young people in the planning of the project. The programme will also fund running costs, setting up costs, equipment and activities.

Hilton in the Community Foundation

Focus on young people - education and health. The Maximum you can normally apply for is £50,000 (per year). Funding can be requested for up to three years for any particular project. No deadlines for grant applications. www.hilton-foundation.org.uk



The Police Property Act Fund

Aims: The Police Property Act Fund is for voluntary and charitable organisations and community groups within the Greater Manchester



area. Groups must show their project meets at least one of their aims which include: To create opportunities for children and young people to get involved in extra-curricular activities. Money will be awarded for specific 'projects', rather than contributing to a general fund or running costs. The deadlines for submission of applications are 31st January and 10th July each year.

How much? Maximum award of £1000

Cash for Kids (previously Manchester Kids)

Aims: Cash for Kids is a grant giving charity, working with Key 103 and Magic 1152 to raise funds to support voluntary and charitable projects who work directly with disadvantaged children. They will fund Courses and training for children and young people, start up, equipment, entrance fees, minibus hire and other transport costs, volunteer expenses and sports kits (min £500 on the latter). Cash for Kids hold 2 rounds of grant funding each year. The deadlines to submit your applications are March 31st or September 30th.



How much? The average grant value is circa £2500, however they will consider larger projects.

BBC Children in Need

Details of scheme: BBC Children in Need funds projects which show a clear focus on children in order to change their lives for the better. The children they help are aged 18 years and under, and live in the United Kingdom. You should only apply for a grant if it will benefit children who are disadvantaged by: any kind of disability; behavioural or psychological problems; living in poverty or situations of deprivation; illness, distress, abuse or neglect

Grant amount: Varies (in 2005/6 grants ranged from £1000 - £100,000)

How Much? Up to £2,000 or for genuine emergencies there is a Fast Track Application for grants up to £500.

Details: The Co-operative Foundation is keen to support community and voluntary sector activity through grants to local groups and organisations which can demonstrate evidence of co-operative values and principles: self-help, equality, democracy, concern for the community. This programme was developed to help groups who want to make a difference in their own communities, through grass roots community activity.

Grant amount: Grants between £500 and £30,000, for one-year projects - either part or total funding. Capital and Revenue funding is available, but salaries won't be funded.

Priorities: Have a number of programmes, their 'breaking the cycle' theme, they support marginalised young people including preventative work with young

people. They also focus support on children aged 5 - 13 who have experience of living with Domestic Violence or projects that are working to promote the safety of children. They also run an annual Summer Playscheme small grants programme from February to May.

They will only fund registered charities and look for user involvement and prefers community based initiatives.

The Henry Smith Charity

Priorities: supports projects that work with young people at risk particularly those living in areas of considerable deprivation. Also funds projects which provide holidays or outings for children from areas of considerable deprivation or children with a disability, aged 13 or under. Only registered charities can apply.

How much? Grant sizes vary (small grants up to £10,000, main grants over £10,000) and are usually for a specific project. Grants can be used for core costs.
