Funding Guide



For Health Projects

Kellogg's Active Living Fund

Priorities: Applications can be considered for projects engaging with young people up to 25 years of age. However priority will be given to applications requesting support for family units – children and adults undertaking physical activity together. Kellogg's are particularly looking for projects that are innovative in their approach to involve children or young people and their families. We aim to fund small community based groups which are voluntary led. Therefore, we do not fund organisations with an annual income that exceeds £50,000.

How Much? Up to £1,000

Application Process: Application Form. The panel meets every two months.

Sport Relief

Priorities: Sport Relief has two priority themes: Feeling or being left out – increasing access to sport and exercise for people who face social exclusion and isolation. Having problems in your life – helping people who are experiencing difficulties in their lives to regain confidence and self-esteem.

How much? The maximum grant is £10,000; however due to the amount of funds available the average size of grant awarded is between £4,000 and £8,000.

Priorities: We can fund projects for people to take part in art, sport, heritage and community activities, as well as projects that promote education, the environment and health in the local community. There are also five prioritised Regional Outcomes that may help towards the success of your bid.

How Much? Between £300 and £10,000

Priorities: The Scheme is aimed at community groups, voluntary sector organisations and schools within the PCT's boundaries. Funding is available for groups and schools to develop new projects that have a health focus and the funding can be used to support a wide range of different activities that have a clear link to health.

How Much? Grants up to £5,000 for new projects

How Much? Small Grants for user-led mental health groups-up to £5,000. Main Grants Programme for advocacy and campaigning – over £5,000

Healthy Heart Grants

Priorities: Heart Research UK Healthy Heart Grants support innovative projects designed to promote heart health and to prevent or reduce the risks of heart disease in specific groups or communities. The Healthy Heart Grant is for heart health projects only and not for general healthy lifestyle projects. Projects that are not specifically for heart health will not be considered.

How much? Grants of up to £10,000 are available to community groups, voluntary organisations and researchers who are spreading the healthy heart message.

Trusthouse Charitable Trust

Priorities: The Trustees will also consider applications from charities based in the UK which undertake health care, health education and community projects; and projects supporting charitable work in developing countries. The Trustees will consider applications in respect of: Physical and Mental Disability: projects involving rehabilitation, (including related arts and sport programmes); projects particularly for ex-service men and women (including former employees of the emergency services); projects for children (including holidays); and respite care; Drugs and Alcohol: rehabilitation of substance and alcohol mis-users;

How Much? The average grant given out is £5,000

Ecomind

Priorities: Ecominds is being delivered through Big Lottery Fund and their Changing Spaces programme. Mind has been announced as an award partner to run an open grant scheme. Ecominds aims to help people with direct experience of mental distress become involved in environmental projects that improve mental and physical health, and local communities. Ecominds will help reduce the stigma surrounding mental distress and help create a society that treats people with experience of mental distress fairly, positively, and with respect.

How Much? Current information suggests 125 grants ranging in value up to £250'000.

Alcohol Education and Research Council Grant programmes



Priorities/details: To increase the capacity of individuals and organisations to deal with alcohol issues and also to develop the evidence base.

Who for? Two types of projects will be considered. **Research projects** that focus upon improving the evidence base. The second will aim to **develop people and organisations**. The Alcohol Education and Research Fund can only be used to pay for project activities that are outside the responsibilities of central or local government agencies and services.

Grant amount: Developing People and Organisations grants are between £5,000 and £50,000. The Council will fund small projects up to a maximum of £5,000. Small grants could fund small research projects, pilot research studies or demonstration projects with a strong evaluation component.

Application process: Application forms are available on the website.

Deadlines: Continuous.

Hedley Foundation

Priorities/details: The main objective of the Trustees' grant-making is to assist and encourage development and change. Most grants will be of capital or one-off nature, but the Trustees sometimes agree to help fund the introduction of new and innovative projects with a series of up to three annual grants.

Who for? A charitable foundation which supports young people, the disabled and the terminally ill.

Grant amount: Few grants exceed £5,000 and most of them go to charities where they can make an impact.

Application process: Applications can be downloaded from the website, should be typed and physically sent to the address below accompanied by your email address or a self-addressed envelope.

Deadlines: The Trustees meet six times a year. The closing date for a meeting is three weeks beforehand.

The Yapp Charitable Trust

Priorities/details: Grants are for core running costs and salaries and are to provide continuation funding for established work only.

Who for? Grants are for work with: older people; children and young people aged 5 to 25; people with disabilities or mental health problems; people trying to overcome life-limiting problems of a social rather than medical origin, such as addiction, relationship difficulties, abuse, a history of offending. Grants are also made to support charities' work in education and learning, (including lifelong learning). Priority is given to work that is unattractive to the general public or unpopular with other funders, helps improve the lives of marginalised people and makes effective use of volunteers.

Grant amount: This year they plan to give about £500,000 in about 100 grants. Grants are for up to three years. Most are for more than one year. Amounts are up to £3,000 a year.

Application process: Application forms are downloadable from the website or by post from the administrator, Margaret Thompson.

Deadlines: Continuous.

Baily Thomas Charitable Fund



Priorities/details: The Baily Thomas Charitable Fund is a registered charity which was established primarily to aid the research into learning disability and to aid the care and relief of those affected by learning disability by making grants to voluntary organisations working in this field.

Who for? They consider under learning disability the conditions generally referred to as severe learning difficulties, together with autism. In this area, they consider projects concerning children or adults. Funding is normally considered for capital and revenue costs and for both specific projects and for general running/core costs.

Grant amount: From £250. Normally one-off grants are awarded but exceptionally a new project may be funded over two or three years, subject to satisfactory reports of progress.

Application process: Application forms are available online.
